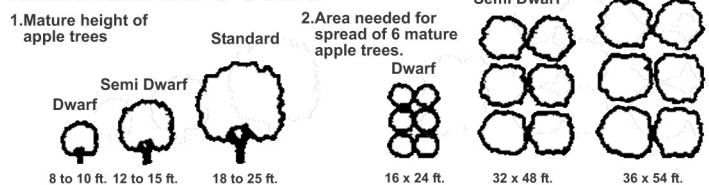
PLANTING THE BACKYARD GARDEN

Fruit Trees

Site and soil requirement - Full sunlight, good drainage, but ample moisture. Avoid planting in cold pockets. pH of 6-7. Add cow manure and peat moss to soil when planting. **DO NOT** fertilize the first year. Can be planted as soon as soil is workable. Plant with graft union above soil level.

Planting distances - These charts are a general guide in determining how many mature fruit trees will fit in your planting area. A mature fruit tree normally has a root system at least as wide as the tree is tall.

AREA PLANTING GUIDE



Pruning - Minimal at time of planting. Remove only damaged or crossing branches.

Feeding - One year after planting, fertilize with 1-2 lbs. of a good organic fertilizer in mid-April to mid-May. Add lime to maintain a neutral pH.

Pest control - Use dormant oil spray to control overwintering insects. We carry a complete line of organic pest controls to combat other pest problems throughout the season.

Small Fruits

Strawberries - Grow in most soil type with a pH of 5.5 to 6.5. Feed with a 5-10-5 fertilizer. Plant 18" apart in rows 3-4 feet apart. The first year remove flowers for better production of fruit the next year. Mulch all plants with a loose, weed-free material such as salt hay or straw in mid to late November. When new growth starts in Spring remove mulch from crowns.

Raspberries and Blackberries - Grow in most soil type with a pH of 5.5 to 6.5. Set plants 24-30" apart in the row with 8-10 feet between rows. Fertilize with 1-2 lbs. of organic fertilizer per 100 square feet. Most varieties will benefit from a trellis to keep canes upright and the fruit off the ground.

Blueberries - Grow best in well drained, acid soil with a pH of 4.3 - 4.8. At planting, space 6 feet apart in rows 6 feet apart. Begin pruning at the end of the third season to remove weakened or dead branches. Feed with Hollytone fertilizer. In addition sulphur should be added at least twice a year based on pH test. Keep well mulched.

Grapes - Plant deep so that the soil level is just above the second bud, and cut canes back to 2 or 3 strong buds. After plant is established, prune when plant is dormant leaving long healthy canes of 100 buds to bear fruit. Feed with an organic fertilizer such as Plant-tone.
